What is Settlement?

- **Settlement** refers to the status of being allowed to live in a country permanently. It means you no longer need a visa to stay and can work, study, and access public services like a citizen.

United Kingdom – Visas Without Sponsorship

1. **Graduate Visa**
 - **Description:** For international students who graduated from a UK university.
 - **Settlement:** No direct path to settlement, but you can apply for other visas later.
 2. **High Potential Individual Visa**
 - **Description:** For graduates from top universities worldwide.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for settlement after 2 years if you meet certain criteria.
 3. **Global Talent Visa**
 - **Description:** For individuals recognized as leaders in their field (science, tech, arts).
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for settlement after 3 years.
 4. **UK Ancestry Visa**
 - **Description:** For Commonwealth citizens with a grandparent born in the UK.
 - **Settlement:** You can apply for settlement after 5 years.
 5. **Spouse/Partner Visa**
 - **Description:** For individuals married to or in a civil partnership with a UK citizen or settled person.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for settlement after 5 years.
 6. **Start-Up Visa**
 - **Description:** For entrepreneurs starting an innovative business in the UK.
 - **Settlement:** No direct path to settlement; may transition to another visa for that purpose.
 7. **Innovator Visa**
 - **Description:** For experienced businesspeople running an innovative business.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for settlement after 3 years.
 8. **Indefinite Leave to Remain (ILR)**
 - **Description:** Permanent residency status in the UK.
 - **Settlement:** Once granted, you have settled status and don't need a visa.
 9. **British Passport**
 - **Description:** Issued to UK citizens.
 - **Settlement:** Full rights to live and work in the UK without restrictions.

European Union – Visas Without Sponsorship

1. **EU Blue Card**
 - **Description:** For highly skilled workers from outside the EU.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for long-term residency after 33 months (or 21 months with language proficiency).
2. **Germany Job-Seeker Visa**
 - **Description:** Allows skilled workers to come to Germany and search for jobs.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for a work visa after finding a job, leading to settlement.
3. **Germany Freelance Visa**
 - **Description:** For self-employed individuals in Germany.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for permanent residency after 3 years.
4. **France Tech Visa**
 - **Description:** For tech professionals working in France.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for permanent residency after 4 years.
5. **Portugal Tech Visa**
 - **Description:** For tech workers in Portugal.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for permanent residency after 5 years.
6. **Spain Non-Lucrative Visa**
 - **Description:** For individuals who want to live in Spain without working for a local employer.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for residency after 5 years.
7. **Estonia Digital Nomad Visa**
 - **Description:** For remote workers from outside Estonia.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for long-term residency after staying for a certain period.
8. **Portugal Digital Nomad Visa**
 - **Description:** For remote workers in Portugal.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for permanent residency after 5 years.
9. **Croatia Digital Nomad Visa**
 - **Description:** For remote workers living in Croatia.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for long-term residency after 5 years.
10. **Greece Digital Nomad Visa**
 - **Description:** For remote workers employed by non-Greek companies.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for long-term residency after 5 years.
11. **Malta Nomad Residence Permit**
 - **Description:** For remote workers living in Malta.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for permanent residency after 5 years.
12. **Hungary Digital Nomad Visa (White Card)**
 - **Description:** For remote workers in Hungary.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for permanent residency after 5 years.
13. **Italy Freelancer Visa**
 - **Description:** For self-employed individuals in Italy.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for permanent residency after 5 years.
14. **Spain Freelancer Visa (Autonomo)**
 - **Description:** For freelancers in Spain.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for permanent residency after 5 years.
15. **Czech Republic Freelance Visa (Zivno)**

16. **Portugal D7 Visa**
- **Description:** For individuals with sufficient income or savings living in Portugal.

17. **Austria Red-White-Red Card**
- **Description:** For skilled workers in Austria.
 - **Settlement:** Can apply for permanent residency after 2 years.

Citizenship Options

1. **EU Passport (Any EU Member State)**
 - **What You Get:** Full rights to live and work in any EU country without restrictions.
 2. **Irish Passport**
 - **What You Get:** Full rights to live and work in the UK and across the EU.

UK Citizens

1. **British Passport**
 - **What You Get:** Full rights to live and work in the UK without needing a visa.
2. **Working in Europe**
 - **What You Get:** May need to apply for work visas to work in EU countries after Brexit.

Type D Visa:

Type D Schengen visa or national long-stay visa

The national visa is the type D long-stay Schengen visa. It is mandatory for any foreigner wishing to study, work or live in a Schengen country for longer than 90 days (up to 1 year).

Job Seeker Visa

Is Germany accepting job seeker visa?

Please note that you will not be allowed to take up employment with a job-seeker visa. Your visa will however be changed to a residence permit for employment in Germany, once you have found adequate employment. The submission of the above-mentioned documents does not guarantee that a visa is granted.

FLR visa

FLR stands for 'Further Leave to Remain' and is an extension to stay in the UK. It typically applies to individuals extending their existing visa (for example a Spouse Visa). There are also instances where an applicant can switch visa categories from another valid visa if their circumstances in the UK change.

Blue Card Sweden

The card gives you the right to work in Sweden with the employer and within the profession you have specified in the application. The card is valid for the period stated in the decision. During the first 24 months, the EU Blue Card is valid only for the employer and the profession stated in your decision.

Can I work in any EU countries with German Blue Card?

No, you cannot use the German Blue Card to work somewhere else in Europe. You will have to apply for the EU Blue Card for that other country, provided that you find a job and meet the criteria. You can apply for an EU Blue Card in another country after you have already worked for 18 months in Germany.

Can I work in Germany with Polish Blue Card?

Persons in possession of an EU Blue Card from another EU Member State for at least 18 months can enter Germany for the purpose of employment without an employment visa.

Can I move to another EU country with Blue Card?

If a third-country national holds an EU Blue Card, after 18 months of regular employment, he or she can move to another EU member state to take up employment.

Can EU citizens work in other EU countries?

If you are a citizen of the European Union (EU), you have the right to live and work in any other EU country. In general, you and your dependents cannot be refused permission to land in another EU country. You may need a valid identity card or passport.

Can you work in UK with EU passport?

Pre-Settled and Settled Status Both settled and pre-settled status allows an EU citizen to work, live or work in the UK after Brexit.

What did Brexit mean?

Brexit is an abbreviation of two English words: 'Britain' and 'exit' and refers to the withdrawal process of the United Kingdom (UK) from the European Union (EU). Article 50 of the Treaty of the European Union regulates the withdrawal process of any Member State.
